Object Complements

New evidence just in:

Object Complements can be nouns or adjectives!! Could they be *distant cousins* of PN's and PA's??

This is exciting news in the English grammar world! Object Complements always rename or replace the Direct Object (DO).

Just like Predicate Nouns (PN) can replace or rename the Subject (S), and Predicate Adjectives (PA) can describe the Subject (S).

It's like the DO has his own little friends to help him out just like the Subject does.

So, if a noun can rename or replace the DO, then it is the Object Complement Noun. If an adjective can describe the DO then it is an Object Complement Adjective. The similarities are just incredible. I may never forget these now!!

Sp Vt Do OCN

(You) Call me Ishmael!!

Simple ~ Imperative ~ Exclamatory

OCN clues

- Always a noun
- Always follows the Direct Object
- Always renames the Direct Object
- It will never be in a sentence that has an Indirect Object. (They don't get along at all)
- Will never be in a Prepositional Phrase

OCA clues

- Always an adjective
- Always follows the Direct Object
- Always describes the Direct Object
- It will never be in a sentence that has an Indirect Object. (They don't get along at all)
- Will never be in a Prepositional Phrase

Mysteries of the 6th and 7th Sentence Patterns revealed!!

OCN's and OCA's have another distinctive quality. They only work with a very exclusive group of verbs.

If you are still not absolutely sure how to label even after you have asked all the right questions, here is a trick that might help.

Substitute the verb in the sentence with a new verb: MADE and see if it helps make it clear.

Even the diagramming is similar!!! The dividing line points back to what it is renaming or describing! Incredible!!!!

The dog licked the dish clean.
